

<u>Rationale</u>

Accessibility Plans became mandatory for all schools in 2003. They describe the ways in which schools will ensure that they are accessible to anyone with a disability, and the arrangements that they have made to make sure that young people and adults with disabilities are not treated less favourably than anyone else.

Schools must implement accessibility plans which are aimed at:

- increasing the extent to which disabled pupils can participate in the curriculum;
- improving the physical environment of schools to enable disabled pupils to take better advantage of education, benefits, facilities and services provided;
- improving the availability of accessible information to disabled pupils.

The original regulations on Accessibility Plans continue to apply to schools, but the plans do not have to be 'standalone'. Since Disability Equality Schemes became mandatory in 2006, they can be included in these schemes or attached to other documents, such as the School Development Plan.

The Equality Act 2010 recommends that schools produce Single Equality Policies and Accessibility Plans can be included in these documents.
